

Pedestrian and Cycling Plan

Fact Sheet



The Doncaster Hill vision is for a vibrant, safe, healthy and socially cohesive community. Pedestrian and bicycle users' amenity and accessibility is a priority in the development of any circulation networks developed for Doncaster Hill.

Doncaster Hill is envisaged to be a centre that provides ready access to an efficient public transport network that can sustain the local population and offers links to a range of destinations. Shared paths will be well connected with appropriately located way finding signage and amenities that make walking and cycling an achievable and enjoyable activity for all ages.

Doncaster Hill Pedestrian and Cycling Plan Review

In 2008/09 Council commenced a review of the Doncaster Hill Pedestrian and Cycling Plan (June 2003) and preparation of the Doncaster Hill Pedestrian and Cycling Plan (May 2009).

This review provided the opportunity to reflect on works completed to date and identify future works to be undertaken, to ensure stronger links to public transport and improve the health and wellbeing of the community.

This Plan will also guide decision-makers and other relevant key stakeholders, at the State, regional and local level regarding the works and initiatives to be undertaken, and will therefore play an important role in being used as a basis for securing future funding.

The Plan was placed on exhibition from June 2009 until August 2009. During this time wide consultation with the community and other stakeholders was undertaken, with comments and feedback considered before final approval of the Plan.

Completed pedestrian and cycling improvements

A range of projects have already been undertaken to improve access and encourage greater pedestrian and cycling activity on Doncaster Hill. These include the Boulevard treatment and Public Art Fence along Doncaster Road, upgrade of the Doncaster Road pedestrian underpass, and the establishment of a network of shared paths between Precinct 1 and Westfield Doncaster.
